City Launches Website Dedicated to General Plan Update

The early phase of a three-year effort to update Diamond Bar's 1995 General Plan is now underway, and the City wants to encourage all residents to get involved and stay informed throughout the process.

Also referred to as a city's "constitution" or "blueprint" for development, the General Plan is a policy document mandated by the state that addresses and serves as the basis for a number of land use planning activities and decisions related to such areas as housing, transportation, environmental quality, economic development, public services, and park and open spaces.

To facilitate participation and communication, the City last month launched an all-encompassing website – www.diamondbargp.com – exclusively dedicated to the Diamond Bar General Plan Update.

Housed on the website is extensive information about this significant effort, including a description of the current project, a frequently-asked-questions section, an at-a-glance project status, and a list of public participation and input opportunities. There is also a library section that currently contains a copy of the 1995 Diamond Bar General Plan, and will be supplemented with meeting presentations, studies and reports as they become available.

The www.diamondbargp.com website will remain live until the project is completed and the City Council has adopted the Diamond Bar General Plan Update, in late summer 2019. Questions or comments about the plan and process are welcome at any time, and you can subscribe to an email newsletter by using your computer mouse to hover over the link "Participate" on the top right corner and clicking on the "Submit Comments and Join Email List" button.

First General Plan Update Community Workshop is November 9

If you have thoughts or ideas on how the city of Diamond Bar should look, evolve and function over the next 20 years, City officials and staff hope to see you at the first community workshop of the comprehensive General Plan Update taking place on Wednesday, November 9 at the Diamond Bar Center.

This workshop starts at 6:30 p.m. and is open to the public. By attending, you will learn about the purposes of the General Plan, the physical, economic, and social implications of the updates, the planning process, the current conditions, issues and trends occurring within the planning area, and upcoming opportunities for public involvement. There will also be an opportunity to interact with City planners and project consultants and identify issues and priorities to be considered during the planning process.

Additional reminders about this workshop will be included in the November issue of DBConnection, posted on the City website event calendar, promoted on the City's government access channel, and shared with local news media outlets.

Free Paper Shredding, E-Waste and Used Book Dropoff, and more at Eco Expo



If you have been holding on to electronic products that have reached the end of their useful life, books that you do not want, or confidential documents that you no longer need to retain, you may want to plan to attend next month's Eco Expo event.

Set for Saturday, November 12, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., Eco Expo will be held at the AQMD parking lot and include a variety of information booths, activities for children, giveaways and recycling opportunities centered on encouraging and facilitating sustainable living practices

Also as part of this event, Waste Management will be giving away up to 80 gallons of mulch to interested residents. This is a "self-serve" giveaway, so containers and tools for loading mulch are strongly recommended.

The City began hosting its Eco Expo event in 2010 to raise awareness about and promote programs that increase the amount of waste diverted from landfills by reducing waste creation, and repurposing or recycling where possible. It coincides with America Recycles Day, a program of Keep America Beautiful, aimed at promoting and celebrating recycling in the United States.

Fire Prevention Week

Once again, the City is joining the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) in promoting Fire Prevention Week, which this year is observed October 9-15.

The goal of the 2016 campaign is to raise awareness about the importance of everyone knowing how old their smoke alarms are and replacing them every 10 years.

To find out how old a smoke alarm is, the NFPA stresses looking at the date of manufacture on the back of the alarm; the alarm should be replaced 10 years from that date, and not the date of purchase.

As a reminder, smoke alarms are needed in every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area, on every level of a home. Ideally they should be interconnected, so that when one is triggered they all sound at once.

IRS Impersonation Scam Alert

The 2016 tax season has long closed and there are still a few months between now and the start of next year's season, however, the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration (TIGTA) warns that it continues to receive reports from members of the public of telephone scam artists calling and pretending to be with the IRS.


According to the callers, the scam artists claim to be an IRS representative and inform their intended victims that they owe taxes and must pay using a pre-paid debit card, money order or a wire transfer. The scammers threaten those who refuse to pay with being charged with a criminal violation, a grand jury indictment, immediate arrest, deportation or loss of a business or driver's license. In some cases, the scam artists have been able to alter the caller ID to make it look like the IRS is calling, they provide false names and IRS identification badge numbers. If you don't answer, they often leave an "urgent" callback request.

To help taxpayers protect themselves, the IRS reminds people that there are several things that scammers often do but the IRS will not:

1. Call to demand immediate payment or discuss taxes owed without first having mailed a bill
2. Demand payment without giving the opportunity to question or appeal the amount you may owe
3. Require use a specific payment method, such as a prepaid debit card
4. Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone
5. Use unsolicited email, text messages or any social media to discuss personal tax issues
6. Threaten to bring in local police or other law-enforcement groups to have you arrested for not paying.

If you get a phone call from someone claiming to be from the IRS and asking for money, here's what you should do:

- If you know you owe taxes or think you might owe, call the IRS at 1.800.829.1040. The IRS workers can help you with a payment issue.
- If you know you don't owe taxes or have no reason to believe that you do, report the incident to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration (TIGTA) at 1.800.366.4484 or at www.tigta.gov.

Protect Your Citrus

If you have orange, lemon or other citrus trees growing in your backyard, the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) urges you to continue to be on the lookout for symptoms of the incurable Huanglongbing, also known as HLB or citrus greening disease.

While not harmful to humans, HLB kills citrus trees and has no cure; it is spread by

a pest called the Asian citrus psyllid as it feeds on citrus tree leaves and stems. Diseased trees need to be removed in order to protect other citrus trees on the property, neighbors' trees and the community's citrus.

To stop this pest and disease from spreading, the CDFA has specialists in the field surveying residential properties, treating citrus trees and removing infected plants. It also asks that residents regularly inspect the citrus trees on their properties and call the free hotline 800.491.1899 to report potential signs of the disease.

Other actions to protect the community's citrus trees include the following:

- Visit your local nursery or garden center to get advice on products that can help protect your citrus tree.
- Do not move citrus plants, foliage or fruit into or out of your area, and especially across state or international borders. This could unknowingly contribute to spread of the pest and disease.
- When planting a new citrus tree, be sure to get your tree from a reputable, licensed nursery in your local area.
- Be sure to dry out citrus tree clippings or double bag them before removing the plant material from the property.

The first detection of HLB in California was in Hacienda Heights in 2012. In 2015, multiple incidences of the disease were found in San Gabriel. A total of 27 diseased citrus trees have been detected and removed, all within Los Angeles County.

Designated Early Voting Ballot Drop-Off Site at City Hall

If you are registered to vote by mail or are considering voting by mail for the presidential general election on Tuesday, November 8, you will be pleased to learn that the Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk (RR/CC) is this year introducing a Vote by Mail Drop-Off Program.

Beginning on Tuesday, October 11 and until Monday, November 7, Diamond Bar City Hall along with other governmental agencies throughout the county will serve as designated ballot drop-off sites.

During this period, Diamond Bar voters may bring their completed vote-by-mail ballot to deposit into a locked box located

inside City Hall during the business hours of Monday through Thursday 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. or Friday 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

To ensure the efficient collection and processing of ballots, a credentialed RR/CC team will stop by City Hall every week until Election Day to collect the ballot box and deliver a new one.

As a reminder, to be eligible to vote in an election, you must be a U.S. citizen, at least 18 years of age, and you must have registered 15 days before Election Day.

You may register to vote online by visiting the California Online Voter Registration System at <http://registertovote.ca.gov>, by picking up a voter registration form at the DMV or City Hall and returning it by mail, or by calling 800.481.VOTE to have the form mailed to you. Requests to register to vote by mail for this upcoming election must be received by the RR/CC no later than Tuesday, November 1.

Families Rally for District of Choice

Nearly a thousand students, parents and school officials joined voices on August 27, in protest of a unilateral decision which jeopardizes the future of the District of Choice (DOC) program.

A rally held at Maple Hill Park was organized by Walnut Valley Unified School District (WVUSD) parents with the purpose of sending a clear message to legislators. "We all have one thing in common – the choice. We're all fighting for our kids," said DOC parent Sam Castorena.

Families and officials from other DOC districts, including Oak Park, Glendora, and West Covina attended the event.

District of Choice allows California parents to transfer their children to a participating school district without a transfer agreement. The school choice program has been in existence for 22 years.

A bill to extend the program had been widely supported, sailing through three Senate committees and the Assembly Education Committee, and approved 38-1 on the Senate floor until August 12, when it was stalemated by Assemblywoman Lorena Gonzalez, chair of the Appropriations Committee.

Without an extension, nearly 10,000 California students in 47 districts will be sent back to their home district at the end of this school year. About 3,600 WVUSD students secure enrollment through the District of Choice.

"We are parents who care and want the right to choose," urged DOC parent Teruni Evans.

If Walnut Valley loses DOC, it would cost \$29 million in funding, which equates to more than 300 employees potentially losing their jobs, closing a quarter of our schools, and cutting programs, said WVUSD Superintendent Dr. Robert Taylor.

Pet Licensing Campaign Continues

Door-to-door canvassing efforts by the Inland Valley Humane Society and S.P.C.A (IVHS) that have been underway since September will extend into the early part of this month.

The purpose of this canvassing is to educate and ensure compliance with the state law that mandates that every dog four months of age or older be vaccinated against rabies and have a current license.

IVHS canvassers work Tuesday through Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.; they wear easily-identifiable uniforms and carry proper identification.

Pet owners found not in compliance with the licensing law will have the option to pay for a new or renewed license on the spot, or pay online at www.ivhsspc.org, by mail or in person at the IVHS office in Pomona.

Revenue collected from pet licensing fees goes toward offsetting the cost of animal care and control services provide by IVHS. In addition to staffing and maintaining a clean and compassionate environment for all the stray, injured and lost-and-found animals in its care, IVHS also:

- Facilitates pet adoptions and reunites lost pets with their owners
- Offers low-cost veterinary care services (spaying and neutering surgery, rabies shots and other vaccines for both dogs and cats, microchipping, deworming, and nail clipping)
- Responds to animal-related emergencies, including requests to pick up seriously sick or injured strays and bring them to veterinarians for emergency treatment, or collect dead strays and wildlife
- Enforces animal control laws and investigates reports of animal abuse.

Have a Minute? Join Statewide Earthquake Drill



The City will once again put its emergency response skills to the test when it takes part in The Great California Shake Earthquake Drill happening on Thursday, October 20. Aimed at helping City officials and staff maintain a state readiness, the drill will cover critical emergency procedures that include evacuating City buildings, working with external first responder organizations, conducting field inspections and issuing emergency notifications. Everyone at home is encouraged to take part by practicing "Drop, Cover, and Hold On" wherever they may be at 10:20 a.m. and staying in this position for at least 60 seconds. The website also includes several useful guides, including one with tips about what to do in situations when you cannot get under a sturdy desk or table.
